Spring Semester 2024, Heritage University CAMP Scholars had the opportunity to attend the Northwest CAMP Consortium Conference hosted at Yakima Valley College. Students attended workshops presented by CoolSpeak youth motivational speakers.

The theme centered mainly on "Living your Parents Dreams". The discussion examined the sacrifices and hard work parents put in to provide a better and brighter future for their students. The one commonality amongst all in attendance is to continue moving forward despite the challenges one will face. It is the parents' perseverance that has shown the students they can prevail too. When life got hard, they still got up and went to work, because that is how powerful their dream is for their children. They understood that when the seeds were planted, they would reap what they had sown and today our CAMPers are living their parents' dreams.

Mental health awareness was mentioned along with the realization that it can hide behind a happy face, and when not identified early on, can lead to dire consequences. Students and staff were separated among tables with people they did not know. Staff stood at each table while there were students sitting with their heads down. Students were asked to raise their hands if they felt they had no one to turn to when they needed help. The results were astonishing, each table averaged at least one person that considered the stresses of life to be too much. We will never know what another person is dealing with until we ask. It opened the eyes for staff to begin to build relationships with their students to help them overcome the obstacles in their lives.


Those speeches made me become more human and grateful for everything and everyone present in my life, as they helped me to be prepared for my college journey.
